A reflection from Pope Francis for the Year of Prayer, for the Thirty-first Sunday of the Year:

Reflecting on Saint Paul's encouragement to pray unceasingly (cf. 1 Thessalonians 5:17), the Church's spiritual writers have asked how to remain in a constant state of prayer. The Russian ascetic tradition developed the prayer of the heart, based on repeating the words, "Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me a sinner", until they become like the air we breathe. The Greek monk Evagrius compared prayer to a flame burning perpetually in our hearts even as we carry out our daily tasks. Prayer thus becomes the backdrop against which every action of our lives finds its deepest meaning. If God can find time for each of us, surely we can find time forhim!

An alternative method for contacting MPs is to sign an online petition, or send an email which contains a pre-prepared standard letter written by someone else. In both cases, the methods have become so overused that MPs have told SPUC that they ignore them completely. So, if you can't arrange to meet your MP in person, writing a personal letter or email is the best. 
